Minutes of the Magnolia Point Women's Club April 13, 2005

Nancy Nettuno opened the meeting at 3:00 pm and welcomed new members and visitors. The Hospitality Committee introduced new members.

Nancy introduced Candy Sanford who gave an overview of the Clay/Baker Kids' Net. This program benefits kids aged infant to 18 who are removed from home abruptly. It provides for needs not being met by the state. The program needs various things for the shelters such as board games, books, magazines, etc. The program needs funds to send the kids to camps for the summer.

Mary Jo Mankoski accepted a \$1,000 check on behalf of Outreach. Sacred Heart Church sponsors this ecumenical program. They are open from 10 am to 2 pm on Tuesday and Thursday and have 15 volunteers who service the Green Cove Springs community. They provide emergency needs such as rent, utilities, pharmacy needs, gas vouchers, food vouchers to supplement the Food Pantry and refer people to other agencies when needed. Applicants much provide the reason for need and 98% of the people helped are from outside of the Sacred Heart Parish. Outreach has helped 421 families this year in the amount of \$31,000.

Cary Hanley suggested that we increase dues next year from \$10 to \$15 to offset the loss of boutique money. Membership voted to accept this motion, however, we could not accept the "yes" vote today. Bylaws, Amendment VIII – Dues, require the motion be presented and a vote rendered at the next meeting in May.

Ann Burden suggested that we increase our contribution to One Child/One Family from \$400 to \$500. This was approved by the membership.

Marsha Zupan reported that we have \$8,129.53 in our checking account, \$1,504.31 in the Charles E. Bennett Account and \$30.28 in our savings account. Today we are giving away \$3,800.
