"Do-It-Yourself" Home Lawn Tips

While dormant lawns don't require much attention, they shouldn't be totally forgotten! There are a few basic practices that should be followed to insure a healthy spring "green up".

Atrazine should have already been applied. It's been my experience that Atrazine is more effective when applied as a

liquid spray rather than a combination product. This is because it is absorbed through the plant's foliage as well as the roots. Use of nitrogen fertilizer should be minimal. A fertilizer with a higher middle and last number (such as 5-20-20) will help the plant store carbohydrates and promote a healthier root system.

Finally, the most common mistake by homeowners is overwatering. Too much irrigation causes a couple of problems: (1) it encourages shallow rooting and (2) weed intrusion. Except in extreme conditions, normal rainfall is more than adequate at this time of year. It is rare that a lawn would need to be watered more often than once every two weeks.

The Board will have to make difficult decisions to reduce the annual losses from golf club operations now that the real estate operation is no longer absorbing the deficits. Bill is confident that "the club can become profitable by attracting additional members from our new residents if we provide a good golfing experience and an efficiently managed facility." Communication with Mitch Montgomery has already begun and he will be giving us updates on the development starting in next month's newsletter.

A Word About Frost

Everyone knows that we must wait for frost to melt before opening the course for play, but few of us know why..... or even what frost actually is!

Frost is the formation of ice crystals in dew as the temperature approaches freezing. A common misconception is that it must be below freezing to have frost form. Not the case as frost can develop with temperatures as high as 38 degrees. Frost appears first in lower, shaded areas that are protected from the wind. Often, there will be no visible frost in some areas (such as the practice green), while others are totally blanketed.

Walking on or mowing the turfgrass while it is frosted causes the ice crystals to rupture the plant's cell walls and dessicate the plant. The length of a frost delay is not predictable as we cannot do anything to make it warmer. Generally, as the temperature rises to 37-38 degrees, frost in the sunny areas will melt. As it continues to rise and the sun gets to the shaded areas, the remaining frost will melt. This is why I cannot predict the length of a frost delay it is impossible to know how high and how rapidly the temperature will rise.

The event will consist of a practice round on Friday, May 2, three 9-hole matches on Saturday, and two 9-hole matches on Sunday.


On Saturday night a catered dinner and dance will be held at the clubhouse for all players and their spouse/guests. Music will be provided by Sass 'N Brass

You Can Never Say Enough About Carts

The single most damaging factor on golf course turf is the "electric cart." Carts cause compaction and wear patterns. We can all help to reduce this damage by following some simple practices. The first, and most obvious, is to use all cart paths around all greens and tees. And, please, park ALL FOUR tires on the concrete!

Moderate traffic doesn't create problems. Compaction and wear are caused by repetition, so the more frequently we drive over the same area, the more damage is done. It is important to observe all signage and we ask that you do not move them! We generally limit the number of signs to two per hole. They do not affect play and are placed in the most visible areas.

The biggest wear patterns will usually be found around the bridges. You can help by reducing the amount of "non-golfer" traffic on the course. Let's try NOT to use #8 as a traveling route to and from the clubhouse. We have a new cart path from the entrance to #8, from Muirfield Drive all the way to the clubhouse. Another "wear area" is developing across #4 (the old #1) by the traffic to and from Shoal Creek Drive.

The more we can avoid using the course for "non-golfing" traffic, the less overall damage is done. Thanks!

Tennis "Court" Report - Frozen Courts?

"Why do clay tennis courts freeze and become unplayable?" That question was posed to me many times in the past month.

The cold weather that North Florida has been experiencing in the last few months has a profound effect on the condition of soft tennis courts. "Clay" tennis courts are not clay at all, but are made of a very fine rock. Therefore, the courts are very porous and very well suited for dry climates. Fast dry courts, as they are sometimes called, do not fare as well in colder, northern climates.

When the temperature dips below 33 degrees for prolonged hours during the night, the water that has accumulated under the court surface becomes frozen. The next day when the sun comes up and the temperature rises, the ice that has saturated the court begins to melt. In the early morning hours, players can play on the hard, frozen surface, but a careful eye must be focused on the areas of the court that are melting.

A thawing tennis court is very slippery and dangerous to play. Following a freeze, it is not uncommon for a clay court to begin melting around the noon hour and remain unplayable the entire day. During the past month, many area tennis clubs were closed for an entire week due to frozen conditions.

Spring Green Up

Tennis Tip of the Month:

"How to Hit a Low Volley".....

Balls that dip below the net level can be difficult for the recreational player to return. An important thing to realize is that any extra motion or swing will result in an error.

As you contact the ball, the racquet head should be above the wrist and the wrist should be firm. As the ball approaches the racquet, any extra head motion or movement will send the ball into the net or long over the baseline. Power on the shot is generated by the firmness of the wrist and forward motion of the body. It is important to remember that the wrist is not used to create power!!! Move forward, keep your wrist firm, bend your knees, and block the ball into the open court.

Keeping the course in such great shape takes a lot of work and we need your help. Please take the time to fix your ball mark plus one other; fill your divots plus one other; and rake the bunkers after hitting out of them. It will leave our course ready for the player(s) behind you and for your next round.

May is "Play Golf America" Month. Sign-up for a "FREE 10 Minute Lesson" on the board outside the Pro Shop. I hope to see many of you out on the range this month.

I've had a number of questions about the rules for water hazards (yellow staked). Simply stated, you have 3 options (all carry a 1 stroke penalty): (1) replay from the last spot, (2) hit from the drop area if one is provided, or (3) identify the spot where the ball LAST crossed the hazard and keeping that spot between you and the hole, drop anywhere on that line going back away from the hole. On hole #3, the island green, that means there is **no option** that allows you to drop on the island surface. All drops must be taken on the other side of the hazard from the green.

Our ladies' clinics will continue on Thursday evenings at 5pm on May 8 and 22 with instruction on pitching and then, short irons. Also, we will begin a nine hole event on Tuesday evenings at 5pm for those of you who enjoy a little mid-week competition. The cost will be \$10 plus cart fees for the event plus a skins game. Come out on Tuesday evenings and join in the fun.

Sign Up To "Adopt-A-Hole"

The purpose of the program is to show pride in your golf course by assisting our maintenance crew. Those who take part will perform chores such as filling divots, fixing ball marks, picking up trash, etc. The purpose is not to create a "to do" list for Mike and his crew and we will actually be doing many of the things that our fellow golfers should already be doing.

Spring Is Here Along With the "Critters"

Now that spring is finally here, it becomes necessary to apply pesticides to the golf course. In a perfect world, there would be no weeds or insects, but ?? You may have noticed some rather unpleasant odors lately. And, it's not a coincidence that you may also have noticed mole crickets break-dancing on the greens and fairways during the midday hours. This is not their preferred activity! Some of the other odors have been caused by the application of pre-emergent herbicides.

There are very few pesticides applied to golf courses that are harmful to humans or wildlife. When it does become necessary to use this type of chemical, the application must be made on a closed day. This means that some discretion and common sense should be used by residents and golfers. While normal exposure to properly applied chemicals is harmless, pets should not be exposed to them. After all, how many dogs wear shoes??? Just one more note. contrary to widespread opinion, insecticides DO NOT chase mole crickets off the golf course and onto surrounding properties. The insecticides either kill them or they don't!!!

May Tennis Tip

Remember that a firm wrist and short back swing will help you control the ball while a loose wrist and long swing will generate more errors. It is important to remember that an experienced player will use both techniques. A firm wrist/compact swing is appropriate when the ball is coming at you fast or you are on the run. In contrast, a longer swing may be called for when a player has a slower ball or a ball in which there is time to get the feet set. A seasoned player will almost always make the correct shot selection while the novice or recreational player will not!!!

Tennis Tip: How to handle high balls

Experienced tennis players know that high balls are meant to be put away, but how should this be accomplished? Here's a brief description of the types of high balls and how to attack them:

- 1) Balls that are high and fast: Keep a firm wrist, take a short backswing, take the pace off the opponent's ball and put it away
- 2) Balls that are high and slow: The best option would be an overhead. If the ball is too low for an overhead, take slightly more backswing, move forward, and put the ball away.

The key to remember is that the faster the ball is coming at you - the less backswing you should take and the more firm your wrist should be. More swing and footwork are required on high floating balls. Whatever the situation, all balls over your head should be considered "putaways."

New Cart Paths

For the safety of everyone, please use the new cart paths along Clubhouse Drive and on Colonial between practice hole #3 and the front entrance.

Remember, cart drivers must be at least 16 years old!

Cart Path Rules

Effective immediately from the hours of 8:00am until dusk, cart paths will be restricted to carts while playing a round of golf. Carts going to and from homes to the clubhouse and sightseeing should use the development roads. The only exception is the path to the right of #9 can be used to get to and from Muirfield Drive.

Currently, many carts travel the paths in the reverse direction of play, causing a safety problem. If current practices do not change before the new nine holes open, the traffic around the new Hole #9 and Hole #9 on the new #9 (current #8 & #9) will be like Blanding Blvd.

From the Pro Shop

Hard to believe the year is already half over. Our "Adopt-A-Hole" program is filling up and we have a special request for our volunteers. You may have noticed a problem with crabgrass creeping in on the greens. If, while fixing ball marks, you could take a few extra minutes to pull some patches of crabgrass, it would help out immensely. It's easy to do by taking an ordinary kitchen fork and inserting it diagonally into the base toward the root, placing your thumb on top of the weed, and pulling straight up. Put a little fairway sand in the hole and you're done. If you have any questions, please see me.

Bunker revitalization is still scheduled for completion this year, but we have had a tremendous amount of erosion along the edges of some. Until we get this corrected, if you are in the washout of the bunker, we are enacting a local rule giving relief without penalty within one club length, no closer to the hole.

With the dog days of summer upon us, we need to occasionally allow the range tee to repair itself. It is an

inconvenience when we move the tee to the other end, but a necessary one. Please do not take balls off the chipping green and hit full shots into the range to avoid driving to the other end. The balls on the chipping green are not replenished through the day, so each one hit out into the range is one less for your fellow members to practice their short game. We appreciate your cooperation.

Congratulations to Chuck Laycock and Tom George for Eagle 2's. Chuck had his Eagle 2 on Hole #1, Tom on Hole #16. The Truth & Consequences of Green Speed

Image Not Years ago, a man named Edward Stimpson loved golf and craved to create more fairness in the game. He invented a device intended to ensure that all the

greens on a course were of relatively equal speed. The idea was to give superintendents a way to compare the speed of the 4th green with the 13th and take steps to equalize them. This was, no doubt, a sound and noble idea. But sometimes bad things happen to good ideas.

Today, his simple tool, the Stimpmeter, is often misused to compare the speed of greens from course to course and unfortunately, to establish a benchmark of putting difficulty. Golfers are sometimes heard to say, "Hey, Hickory Hills was 'stimping' 13 last week." This essentially means that the greens were as fast as the linoleum on most kitchen floors.

From a purely competitive standpoint, that's okay. However, this quest for fast greens has serious consequences in terms of cost, environmental quality and the long-term health of the green. In short, speed can kill. Here's why: A healthy, vigorous green can be maintained at a very short cutting height (as low as 1/8-inch) for short periods of time without serious consequences if it's been prepared properly and weather conditions are acceptable. Courses hosting tournaments often take months (and spend significant extra money) to bring greens up to an ultra fast speed for PGA Tour players. For example, the greens at Augusta National or Oakmont may "stimp" up to 14 when properly prepared and dry.

However, fast greens are extremely fragile. They become susceptible to diseases and pests, and therefore may require more chemical treatments. Weather can also quickly destroy the health of an ultra fast green. High temperatures and lack of moisture in the air are deadly to greens that are maintained at very short cutting heights for any length of time.

The risks of maintaining fast greens -- even with the best professional management by superintendents -- were apparent in the summer of 1995 when golf courses across the eastern United States lost greens during an extended period of drought and high temperatures. Many of the world's best-known courses suffered serious damage and were unplayable for the last half of the year. Many of these had to be reseeded or completely rebuilt at a cost that was high in terms of budget, playability and reputation.

The solution to the dilemma of fast greens is twofold. First, the golf industry is sponsoring and promoting research and development of new grasses that are more tolerant of fast speeds under adverse conditions. Organizations such as the USGA and GCSAA are investing millions in this effort.

On the other side, golfers should understand and accept the limitations of these living systems called "greens." Golfers should also heed the advice of superintendents who manage, nurture and protect these ecosystems. And finally, many golfers must change their attitudes about the competitive aspect of green speeds. They should, in the footsteps of Mr. Stimpson, strive for fairness, not fastness.

Tennis "Court" Report

TIP OF THE MONTH - Where should I hit the ball? Even experienced tennis players face this problem! First, you should try to find your opponent's weakness and then to exploit it. This is always a good strategy, but some advanced opponents do not have obvious weaknesses and the challenge is to move the opponent around the court to find the weakest part of their game. Another issue to consider is that hitting down the line is inherently more risky than hitting cross court because the net is higher on down the line shots. What is one to do if the opponent's weakness is returning a down the line shot? Should one hit to the opponents weakness down the line and risk missing, or hit to their strength cross court? The solution is not simple and may require some experimenting before you develop a successful method. Although, once you determine a strategy that works for you the opponent may counter it and render your plan ineffective. If all else fails, remember, in a pinch, it pays to keep the ball in play.

Meet The Fravala Family.....


Meet one of our new full family golf members – Jeff and Linda Fravala and daughter, Hanna. Although originally from New

Tennis "Court" Report

Tennis Tip - "The Serve"

One of the main components to the game of tennis is the serve. In most cases, the serve dictates who will win or lose a match. It is the stroke that must occur before any other ball is hit and therefore, should be taken very seriously. A good serve can enable a player

to win many easy points. However, a poor serve can be the downfall of any player. Since the serve is so crucial, it is imperative to get the first serve in and put pressure on your opponent.

If you are the server, take your time before you deliver the serve and put great effort into focusing on all serve components. Throw a good toss that is within easy striking distance. Secondly, get up after the tossed ball quickly to ensure that it does not drop too low. A low toss is almost certain to go into the net. Thirdly, turn your body sideways and aim for the diagonal box. If you can master these service steps, your serve can be a weapon in your arsenal of shots and not a drawback. The serve is a very important shot and is worthy of considerable attention and practice.

Tennis "Court" Report

Tennis Tip: What are big points and how do I win them?

The one thing that most advanced tennis players understand is that the key to success in tennis is winning the big points. The main problem that most

novice players have is "identifying what is a big point." A big point would be the first point of every game. This is where a player can set the tone for the duration of the match. Another big point is the crucial 3rd point of any game. This is where the momentum of the game will generally shift in one direction. Lastly, the ad-in and adout points are important because the game hinges on winning these points. Conversely, when you are down LOVE-40 or up 40-LOVE, the next point may not be as crucial, but it's a good time to be aggressive.

The next question is what to do to win these "big" points. If you are serving and want to win the first point of a game, it is imperative to get the first serve in play. This may require slowing down the pace of the serve or mixing the serve up (i.e. hitting at the opponent's body). If you are receiving in the first point of a game, it is important to get the return back in play. The key to winning the crucial 3rd point of any game is to stay quick on your feet, stay focused, and when in trouble, keep the ball in play. Remember, the server always has a definite advantage in any of these situations. When you are facing ad-in or adout, this is when your focus needs to be at its highest. These points will dictate who will likely prevail in the match. So, this is the time to raise the level of your game. Seasoned players tend to be more aggressive on these points and, therefore, will put more pressure on the opposition.

Fall Tennis Leagues/Clinics

Keep in mind that the fall team season will start the first week in September and the overall tennis action will greatly increase. Our ladies B team will begin their second season in the Interclub League and the C team is organized and ready to go. Our junior intermediate tennis team will also begin their second year after last year's successful season. Our men's senior team will begin action in mid-October after the weather cools down a bit. All of our teams could use some additional players, so if you are interested in league play, be sure to call me or any of the captains.

Developer Update from Montgomery

Property Management Systems, Inc. has named Andrew Street the new property manager for Magnolia Point.

The Medinah Lane extension to CR 315 is proceeding as planned per the City Council meeting last Tuesday night. The roadway will be the secondary access for residents of Magnolia Point Golf & Country Club and will serve only our residents. The rear entrance will be controlled with a scanner system/gate arms for the ingress/egress of residents. Magnolia Point Ventures (MVP) is very excited about the construction of this access road because it is something the residents have been looking forward to for several years. They anticipate completion of the roadway within 120 days. In addition, they will improve the intersection of Magnolia Point Boulevard and Colonial and Muirfield Drives by eliminating the confusing intersection and creating a simple "T" intersection.

The request brought before the City Council last Tuesday night was to afford MPV an extension on the 500th building permit being issued before the west access road is constructed. The request was made because of delays experienced in attaining approval through the City of Green Cove Springs - due to water pressure issues they had to resolve before the roadway plans could be fully approved by the City. In their opinion, the delay was justified in order for the City to feel comfortable with the water pressure solution and for the developer to negotiate the cost participation in the modifications to the potable water systems.

In summary, Magnolia Point residents will get the west access road constructed and the potable water pressure fixed simultaneously!!

From Tee to Green - Overseeding

For our non-golfers, here's an explanation as to why we "overseed" the greens and tees on the golf course. Our primary grass is bermuda and as cooler temperatures approach, it's growth slows down and basically stops growing. Golfers could play on this surface, but excessive traffic would wear down the crowns and we would have bare soil areas in the spring. Not a pretty picture!

Our course was overseeded on Monday, October 20. The greens and tees were first verticut to reduce the thatch buildup and to open the turf to allow the seed to fall to the soil. This is ideal for seed germination and minimize movement of the seed due to wind and water erosion.

Although the timing of overseeding varies around the country, our objective is to seed as late in the year as possible when the bermuda grass growth is slowed by lower temperatures, but favorable for germination. The goal is a uniform playing surface with no adverse effects on ball roll.

During this past week, "syringing" has taken place throughout the day. Thanks for being patient with our staff during this time as we are trying to provide good winter greens for your golf play.

Using Effluent Water On Golf Courses

Water is the most precious resource on Earth. And despite the amazing ability of turfgrass to use water efficiently, concerns about conservation have led golf courses to increasingly turn to effluent water for irrigation.

Sometimes called "gray water," effluent is essentially partially treated wastewater from community sewage or industry. It usually is cleansed of major pollutants, but still

contains enough trace amounts of saline (salt), heavy metals (such as zinc and cadmium) and bacteria to render it undrinkable.

In the past, communities often simply dumped effluent back into lakes and rivers. But today, golf courses are being viewed as environmentally desirable disposal sites for effluent. In fact, golf courses can serve as highly effective wastewater treatment facilities for this partially polluted water. Just this past week, the City of Green Cove Springs started pumping it's "gray water" through our golf course irrigation system. We will no longer have to pump our irrigation water from the ground.

Dense, well-managed turfgrass areas are among the best filtration systems available for polluted water. The thatch layer in turf, which consists of dead and decaying organic material, traps and holds particulate pollutants in the water and allows them to degrade naturally. The effluent that goes on the course as irrigation is actually cleansed and returned to lakes, streams and groundwater supplies.

Although the use of effluent on golf courses poses challenges for superintendents who must cope with high salinity and other pollutants, golfers should not notice any differences.
